

How far we have come from the days of the now defunct YMCA Annex and an H-Hut on Quebec Street! Starting with 26 adults engaged in creating crafts, today Hutton House supports over 700 individuals in pursuit of their personal goals. We are proud of our accomplishments over the years but are ever mindful of the legacy that began in 1952 that laid a strong foundation that continues to serve us well as we build toward a future of new possibilities.

THANK YOU to all of our staff, volunteers, supporters, partners, families and friends, both past and present. Through your commitment and support we have become a strong organization that is enhancing the quality of life of many individuals in our community.

Here are some highlights of our 60th!

Thanks to Special Olympics Ontario and the Hay Foundation for donating equipment to the Hutton House Fitness Centre. We were able to acquire a recumbent bike, a progression Olympic bench and rack and a new treadmill. Over 70 participants exercise at the Centre on a weekly basis, so the equipment is being put to good use. Every person receives a fitness program designed to meet their needs. We also have a number of other sites where we provide support, such as the YMCA, Jazzercise, Fanshawe College, etc.

We were pleased to partner with Special Olympics to provide additional training/practice for athletes qualified for Provincial, National and World Levels of competition. Congratulations to the athletes!



HIGHLIGHTS OF THE YEAR

- Through a special grant from the LHIN (Local Health Integration Network), the Day Break crew was able to purchase two fridges (how much can they possibly eat??), two new recliners (no excuse to slack off!), computers and a new server for the computer lab. Day Breakers are active in the community attending many events and special attractions including Home County, Ribfest, Sunfest, Ska-Nah-Doh village, Port Stanley, and Coyle's Country Store.
- ABC Life Literacy Canada continued to partner with Hutton House to offer participants Money Matters workshops and this year they produced a video highlighting the contributions of the TD Bank volunteers, featuring Hutton House. Check it out by going to our website and visiting Programs / Adult Education
- Best Buddies is a program designed to foster friendships between people with intellectual disabilities and students from Fanshawe. This year there were 10 match ups with group get togethers for Valentine's Day and a visit to the Hume Cronin Observatory. For more information email jenniferv@huttonhouse.com.
- On April 26th Access Voluntarism (AV) received the June Caldwell Outstanding Achievement Award for Voluntarism, along with 6 other organizations from across the province. For the past 14 years, AV has helped more than 500 people with disabilities complete 146,000 hours of volunteering, making meaningful contributions to their community. What a great accomplishment on the part of staff and participants! Not only that, we have completed 14 years in our partnership with the City to keep Storybook Gardens clean for the enjoyment of visitors.
- ARTworks kicked off our 60th celebrations with its first art show at Hutton House, opening on April 9th. The Studio Artist program has existed since 2004 and 12 artists exhibited over 100 paintings in a wide variety of mediums. The weather was nasty, but the atmosphere was electric with the exuberance of the artists and fabulous food by the London Training Centre. About 150 art lovers were in attendance and that evening, we sold over 70 paintings! Congratulations to the staff and artists for presenting a first class event!
- This year, Employment Services became a Purchase of Service agency for Ontario Works, increasing our capacity to serve even more individuals with disabilities in their search for employment. The Hutton House Learning Centre has never been busier!
- Employment Services received funding from Service Canada to sponsor Business Without Barriers, a dinner event to promote the business case for hiring of persons with disabilities. About 90 employers attended to hear Mark Wafer, owner of 6 Tim Horton franchises. In addition, a number of short employment videos were developed as part of a media campaign. They can be viewed on line through the Hutton House website. The event was highly successful and will lead to new opportunities... way to go to those who worked on this project!
- Elvis was in the building. A 60th birthday party was held on June 5th with 250 people rocking to the music of Elvis. Great pizza, great fun. We also debuted a video about 60 years of service. It was a great night enjoyed by all. Thanks again to the staff who organized the event...poodle skirts and crinolines are back!

TREASURER'S REPORT

I am pleased to report on the financial position of Hutton House Association for Adults with Disabilities for the year ending March 31, 2013

We received approximately \$3.0 million in various funding allocated for operating expenses during the year, primarily from the Ministry of Community & Social Services, Employment Ontario, the South

West Local Health Integration Network and Human Resources and Skills Development Canada. All funds were used to support individuals through our three locations: Hutton House, the Hutton House Learning Centre and Day Break. Other revenue includes the Ministry of Health Promotion, Autism Speaks Canada, the City of London, London Community Foundation, PricewaterhouseCoopers Canada Foundation, fees for service and Hutton House Foundation.

Audited financial statements were prepared by Ford Keast LLP, Chartered Accountants providing an independent opinion on the financial position and operating results of Hutton House for the year ended March 31, 2013. The balance sheet shows total assets of approximately \$2,029,000 (\$2,120,000 in 2012), liabilities of approximately \$915,000 (\$998,000 in 2012), and a resulting net asset position of approximately \$1,114,000 (\$1,122,000 in 2012). The audited financial statements of Hutton House are used in reporting to government and are available to the public upon request.

For fiscal 2014 we anticipate that our funding will remain consistent with fiscal 2013.

We move forward with confidence in our commitment to build on our capacity to identify and respond to the needs of existing and potential participants. Thank you to all of our funders, sponsors and volunteers for your continued support.

Deficiency of Revenue over Expenses



A WALK DOWN MEMORY LANE

"An old-fashioned house on Queens Avenue become a place for 26 handicapped adults to learn that life still held much of interest and usefulness for them. A survey across Canada found that no similar society had been set up to meet this great need! In October of 1952 the Association for Handicapped Adults came into being with R. H. Roberts, a retired school teacher, as President and L. B. Hyde as Vice-President.

The program operated 3 mornings a week out of the YMCA Annex until 1954 when it was torn down. The program was funded by service clubs, church auxiliaries and public donations. Fund-raising activities included the "Blue and Silver Annual Prom" a coffee and sherry hour followed by a fashion show and Firemen's Association benefit ball games.

While incorporated October 1953, it was on March 29, 1954 that J. P. Robarts presented the Association with the First Ontario provincial charter of its kind ever to be granted. Board members present were A. G. Davidson, Fred Gosnell (later to become Mayor of London), William Metcalfe, Jean Trimbell, Dr. Inman, Mrs. John Jeffrey and Frank Gray (Acting President).

August 6, 1954 an H-Hut at Wolsey Barracks was donated by Keillor Construction and moved to 704 Quebec Street. 35 adults attended twice weekly classes for lessons in leather work, weaving, jewellery making, felt, hooked rugs, ceramics and shell work. The workshop earned \$500 that year, with two thirds of it being returned to the students. The Association operated at that site for 19 years until 1973.

From 1971 to 1973, the Association negotiated with the City of London to purchase the Hutton Road School property through a \$50,000 grant from the City. On September 4, 1973 the agency relocated to 654 Hutton Road. A 5-day workshop program was introduced with a variety of activities available to 38 severely handicapped persons. Life skills, education and work were the primary goals of the Association.

The Association outgrew the 100 year old school. In 1985, the front half of the property was sold and construction began. 1.1 million dollars was raised with Colonel Tom Lawson as the Honourary Chairperson. Hutton House moved to temporary quarters in a local warehouse. The building was ready on August 26, 1986 and officially opened on November 9th. On November 28, 1986 the Hutton House Gift Shop opened its doors in the adjacent Hutton Plaza. In May of 1989, Shoppe in the Park, seasonal retail store, opened in Springbank Park.

The Association changed its name in 1992 to the London Association for Disabled Adults. Today, we provide services and supports to over 700 members of our community. The vision of our forefathers persists with us today as we seek new and innovative ways to accomplish our Mission.

ABOUT OUR NAME

In 1834, it is likely that there was a log school and four log houses located in clearings surrounded by dense forest. The name Hutton was given to the school because of an uncle of Judge Elliott. Apparently "Daddy Hutton" lived close to the school and was well loved by all the students. It is interesting to note that the Crossans, who had owned farmland adjacent to the Hutton property since the 1880's, had 4 generations who attended the school and Kelly Bridge (nee Crossan) worked at Hutton House.
