## Hutton House 2019/2020 Event Highlights

Hutton House had a busy year of events and celebrations. Some highlights from this year included:

Our annual **Volunteer Appreciation** night was held April 11 to celebrate the dedication and commitment of volunteers within all of our programs as part of National Volunteer Week.

A **Documentary Video Launch** called "*United Voices The Autism Employment Advantage*" took place April 25 at Hillside Community Church. Hutton House collaborated with Bridging the Gap, a local group affiliated with the London Chapter of Autism Ontario as well as the Rotary Club of Hyde Park and Leads to premiere this short documentary about the benefits of diversity in the workplace.

May 11 we held our annual **Pottery Spring Sale** and the **Adult Education Celebration** was held May 22 honouring the achievements of learners in one to one tutoring and group classes. Michael Hollis was awarded the **Marilyn Neufeld Lifelong Learning Award**.

June 1 we had a booth at the **Forest City Comicon** and **Anderson Craft Ales** hosted a **Boot Camp Class** and a **Yoga Class** at the brewery to raise funds for Hutton House June 22.

The 23<sup>rd</sup> annual **West Haven Charity Golf Classic** was held July 17 raising \$40,500.00 and we participated for the first time as an organization in the **London Pride Parade** July 28.

In September we were invited to have a **booth at the Western Fair** to sell pottery and other items created by participants and hosted an **Ontario Trillium Foundation Recognition Event** September 17 to thank OTF for their support of the pottery program and a fitness program for seniors.

The **AV Celebration** was unfortunately cancelled October 10 as all schools were closed which included Eagle Heights Public School where we typically gather to recognize the contributions of volunteers at community agencies.

October 22, we helped organize a theatrical event at Kings College called **Birds Make Me Think About Freedom**, a play about the history of institutionalization of persons with disabilities performed by a Theatre Troupe from L'Arche Toronto. Hutton House was proud to be one of the community partners along with L'Arche London, L'Arche Stratford, Community Living St. Marys, Participation House Support Services, London Arts Council and King's University College at Western University.

The Employment Services at the Learning Centre hosted **Job Fairs** October 30 and February 26, bringing together employers and job seekers.

The third **Festive Fashion Show** at Cherryhill Mall November 14 organized by Minto and supported by the mall merchants raised funds and awareness of our services and gave participants the opportunity to shine on the runway!

November 16 a group of participants who work at Goodlife participated in the **Spin4Kids** event in support of the Goodlife Kids Foundation.

November 20 we celebrated being nominated as a finalist in the Collaboration Category at the **Pillar Non Profit Innovation Awards**.

November 28 we celebrated the **20<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the Day Break Program** with participants, families, staff old and new as well as our funder the SWLHIN.

We welcomed the London community to come and check out our programs during **Doors Open London** September 14. Mosaic pieces were created by visitors and put together in a mural which hangs in the main entrance at the Wonderland Rd location.

Our annual **Christmas Party** was held in December at Four Points by Sheraton.

Our final **GPS Graduation** of our current contract was held January 20 to honour the hard work of the participants in completing the program and finding employment in their chosen fields.

Due to the COVID-19 pandemic events that had to be cancelled were the **Income Tax Preparation Clinics** March 18 and 23. Despite the cancellation of the clinics Ford Keast still completed 56 tax returns for participants and their families who dropped off their returns to Hutton House instead which were then delivered to Ford Keast for completion.

An Employment Services event called **Demystifying Disabilities: Maximizing Your Business Potential** to be held March 26 at The Factory on 100 Kellogg Lane also had to be cancelled.

Thank you to everyone who helped organize and also support these events through sponsorships and attendance. These events not only raise awareness about Hutton House but more importantly are an opportunity for us to celebrate our accomplishments together.

## MESSAGE FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

Over the past year Hutton House has continued to offer supports and services dedicated to the needs of participants. We met some challenges along the way that required us to realign our services to meet the current environment.

Our participants and programs continue to benefit from the support of students from paid and unpaid placements. Our academic partners include Fanshawe College, Western University, University of Waterloo, Lambton College and John Paul II SS. The federal Canada Summer Jobs program enabled us to hire 11 students in various programs last summer.

The Adult Education program offered a pilot program of fee for service opportunities with funding from the City of London up until December 31, 2019. These classes were well received and fee for service classes are continuing as part of the Adult Education program.

The Goals, Preparations, Skills (GPS) program wrapped up a successful contract through the federal Skills Link funding in February. This program provides youth 15 – 29 years of age with 3 weeks of in class and 12 weeks of work experience all while getting paid. Having exceeded all targets, GPS was renewed for another 2.5 years. Congratulations to the staff and all the graduates of GPS.

We continue to work on our strategic directions identified in our Strategic Plan. Highlights include the success of our Passport program which is now supporting 62 individuals and families. The Western Fair Market continues to bring awareness of the pottery studio as well as products created through self employment initiatives of participants. The Board of Directors developed and administered a Family/Caregiver Survey to get feedback on how we are doing and how we could better support their needs. Family/Caregiver meetings are being planned for the future to identify next steps.

LIFEworks 2 and 3 operated a booth at the Masonville Market on Friday mornings throughout the summer and fall. Produce and maple syrup was provided by Silvercreek Farms and participants made crafts to sell. Participants were able to practice their customer service and literacy skills. Proceeds from the booth helped to enhance experiences in both programs.

We are in the third year of a 3 year GROW grant from the Ontario Trillium Foundation (OTF) in the pottery studio where participants are creating items to sell, filling 8 pottery classes each week and planning trips to local clay art galleries for inspiration. OTF also provided a Seed Grant to offer fitness programs to seniors and a Capitol Grant to increase accessibility at the Learning Centre with accessible room buttons and more accessible features in our washrooms.

The Hutton House Foundation continues its generous support of our work. This year we were able to put in new flooring at the Learning Centre, update our computer database and network, refresh some areas with new paint, and made our washrooms at the Learning Centre and Main Building more accessible with handrails.

The South West Local Health Integration Network (SWLHIN) provided funding to purchase a new van to enhance our ability to offer more community opportunities. As well funds were made available to renovate the kitchen area, add more educational materials and update the Snozzelin room with new equipment. We are grateful for the support and recognition of the needs of individuals with high needs and their families.

We have continued to provide training to all staff through a program called Beyond Silence. This initiative was funded by the Ministry of Labour through the Public Services Health and Safety Association. It has been helpful to provide information about best practices in workplace mental health.

At the end of January we submitted all of the required documentation related to the 13 Accreditation Standards in order to be considered for accreditation by FOCUS. Our onsite validation date has been delayed by the COVID-19 Pandemic and will take place sometime in 2021.

At our staff professional development days in December, all staff were updated on the work of the 13 FOCUS Accreditation Committees. As a group we reviewed our mission, vision, service principles and philosophy. It was evident in the discussions that staff take these guidelines to heart in the things they do each and every day.

We made a difficult decision to end the Skills 4 Life program which was operating from the 781 Richmond St location and supported 18 adults with significant intellectual disabilities. This program was a partnership with Fanshawe College and funded by MCCSS through a grant which ended March 31 2020 and also a fee for service model. The individuals who attended this program learned a vast array of skills which they used at Skills 4 Life, at home and in community settings. The dedication of the staff to make this program a success is to be highly commended. They were a dedicated team who supported individuals to do and be their best each day. Hutton House thanks the families for their trust and support of this project.

Over the past year we have provided services to over 1100 individuals. We are grateful to be able to support the interests and needs of participants and it is a privilege for us to support everyone to learn new skills, make new connections and grow as members of our community.

As of March 17 all Hutton House locations were closed due to the COVID-19 Pandemic. It is difficult for all staff and participants not to be together and we feel the loss of these meaningful connections. As we move through these uncharted waters Hutton House will continue to find new ways to reinvent ourselves and be responsive to the needs of participants and families.

Thank you to everyone – the Board of Directors, the Hutton House Foundation, the staff, volunteers, students, community organizations and businesses and most importantly our participants and their families for continuing your support and participation in all that Hutton House has to offer.

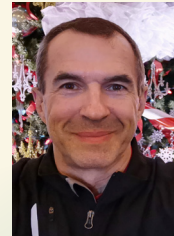

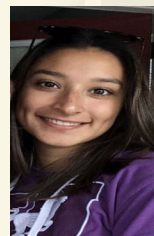

## TREASURER'S REPORT



I am pleased to report on the financial position of Hutton House Association for Adults with Disabilities for the year ending March 31, 2020. We received approximately \$3.9 million in various funding allocated to operating expenses during the year, primarily from the Ministry for Children, Community and Social Services, Employment and Social Development Canada, the Ministry of Labour, Training and Skills Development and the South West Local Health Integration Network. Other revenue includes fees for service, the Hutton House Foundation, Ontario Trillium Foundation, the City of London and donations.

Audited financial statements were prepared by Ford Keast LLP, Chartered Professional Accountants providing independent opinion on the financial positions and operating results of Hutton House the year ended March 31, 2020.

I am pleased to report that we generated a surplus of Revenue over Expenses of over \$100,000.00 representing 2% of Revenue.

The audited financial statements of Hutton House are used in reporting to the government agencies and are available to the public upon request.

COVID-19 began to affect our operations in mid-March of this year. Our next fiscal year will be very challenging year as we cannot predict when we will be able to resume operations and if we are it will likely be a phased in approach. Your Board of Directors are monitoring the current financial position however we are confident our overall surplus of \$1,200,000 will be sufficient to see us through to a better time.

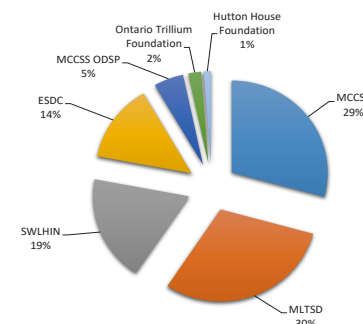
